We hope you enjoy the first issue of our Johnson County 4-H alumni newsletter!

We realize there is a huge communication gap between us and the 4-H Alumni living in Johnson County. We want to stay connected to you and keep you up to date on what we are doing.

First of all, if you weren't in 4-H in Johnson County or if it has been awhile there are probably some new faces at the Extension office. On staff right now we have Tara Markley, 4-H Agent; Amanda Fraunfelder, 4-H Program Manager; and

Christin Bartels, 4-H Office Professional. We are all new within the last 3-4 years.

We currently have 19 4-H clubs all over the county and a little over 550 4-H'ers. There are 38 different projects to choose from but the possibilities are endless.

We are excited about some of the new programs in Johnson County and value the long standing traditions of 4-H. SPIN clubs are one of the newest delivery modes for 4-H which you can read about below.

We have hundreds of wonderful volunteers in our system that help out in one way or another. Some take on huge roles while others give time, money or resources when they are able. Check out the column to the right to see what ways you could give back. Volunteers do not have to have 4-H knowledge if you know someone that has a particular skill they are wanting to share, let them know about 4-H.

Special Interest (SPIN) Clubs

Depending on how long ago you were in 4-H, SPIN clubs might be a new concept for you. SPecial INterest clubs have been around in Johnson County now for about four years. Why they are great for volunteers is because they are a much smaller commitment than some traditional 4-H volunteer roles. SPIN clubs usually last a couple months and meet only 6-8 times total. SPIN clubs also just focus on one topic.

SPIN club leaders get sup-

port from the Extension Office and have one or two other co-leaders. SPIN leaders just need to go through the Volunteer Screening Process as do all 4-H volunteers.

We have had gardening, honeybee, shooting sports, geology and reading SPIN

clubs so far. Is

there a topic you would be interested in co-leading? We would love to meet with you and discuss the possibilities.


County/State where I was in 4-H - I was a member of the Willow Valley Go-Getters 4-H club in Greenwood County, Kansas.
