Science Matters

The Johnson County 4-H program has been chosen as one of five key markets for a new and exciting program sponsored by National 4-H Council and Bayer. The program aims to inspire young people to become tomorrow's science leaders, positively impacting the health and lives of people, plants and animals. The overall goal of the Science Matters program will drive youth to a pathway that will deepen their understanding of how science connects to their food, animals and health; spark their interest in agri-science careers; empower them with the skills and support to show their communities just how much science matters.

Youth will also earn a free trip to Washington, D.C. to attend the National 4-H Agri-Science Summit. The program will consist of 12-16 teens ages 14-18, broke down into teams, who will work on and develop community action plans from the information gained at the National 4-H Agri-Science Summit. The action plans will be based on the Science

Matters Mission: Inspire young people to become tomorrow's science leaders, positively impacting the health/lives of people, plants and animals. We will also be partnering with local Bayer employees throughout the project! This is a brand new program to Johnson County as well as National 4-H.

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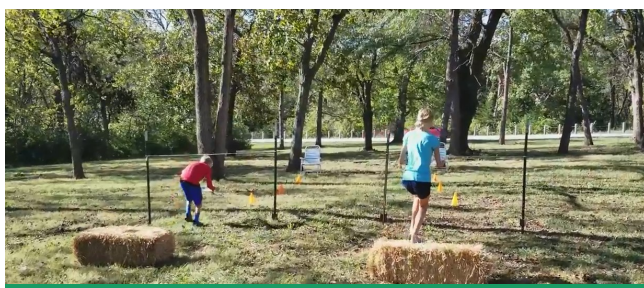
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Event Highlights

Food Fare

4-H Clubs as well as the Extension Master Food Volunteers create a booth that follows a specific theme. This year's theme is "Around the World". A new theme is chosen each year. The last four themes were: Holiday, Movies, Restaurant Copy Cats and Books.

A Food Fare Booth is organized by a club and relates to the theme. No two Food Fare booths look the same, but booths usually consist of about 3-6 homemade food samples and decorations. This is a great opportunity for 4-H'ers to get the chance to plan and carry out a menu as well as improve their cooking skills.

A Food Fare participant gets to visit each booth at their own leisure and taste all the delicious food! It's free to all 4-H families and the public but we do ask that a non-perishable food donation be brought for a food bank. Families also must pre-register so each booth knows how much food to make so that there is enough food for all attending participants. It's a fun opportunity for the family to get to try tasty food and maybe get some
