Bloom Wood

1. Flowers are produced on new (current season's) wood
2. Flowers are produced on wood from past season; pruning before bloom will eliminate flowers
3. Blooms on old & new wood

Bloom Time

4. Prune after flowering if needed
6. Mid-season sheer if formal hedge is desired
8. Fall/early winter cut to ground
10. Wait until new growth appears before pruning
12. **Ask First!** Seldom requires pruning to control size

DDD means prune for Dead, Dying, Damaged - should be done at any time as needed

Pruning Guidelines - Shrubs & Trees

5. **Thinning Out Pruning** - select the oldest, woodiest stems in the shrub and completely remove to the ground. Remove no more than 1/4 to 1/3 of the total number of the branches in the shrub each year
7. Do not cut into old wood (dead zone) that has no leaves or needles
9. **Cut Candles** (new growth) in half when needles are fully elongated - only when needed to control size
11. **Rejuvenate** plant by cutting to approx. 6 inches from soil level

Pruning Guidelines - Perennials & Grasses

- A. **Cut Back** to just above ground level in Designated Month
- B. Remove dead / dying foliage
- C. **Cut Back** to just above ground level after Peak Bloom
- D. Deadhead
- E. **Cut Back** to 12-inch height
- F. **Leave in Fall**; clean up in Spring

Perennials - Spring Clean-up Note:
If Code A or B in Feb. or March - For the beneficial insects to emerge, no clean up until consistent temps in the 50's; may need to delay clean-up into April.

13. **Shake** to remove dead needles & use strong hose to dislodge
15. **Head Back** to lower side branch or outward facing bud to reduce height
