- Wait until new growth appears before pruning
- Ask First!** Seldom requires pruning to control size

**DDD** means prune for Dead, Dying, Damaged - should be done at any time as needed

### Pruning Guidelines - Shrubs & Trees

- Thinning Out Pruning** - select the oldest, woodiest stems in the shrub and completely remove to the ground. Remove no more than 1/4 to 1/3 of the total number of the branches in the shrub each year
- Do not cut into old wood (dead zone) that has no leaves or needles
- Cut Candles** (new growth) in half when needles are fully elongated - only when needed to control size
- Rejuvenate** plant by cutting to approx. 6 inches from soil level

### Pruning Guidelines - Perennials & Grasses

- Cut Back** to just above ground level in Designated Month
- Remove dead / dying foliage
- Cut Back** to just above ground level after Peak Bloom
- Deadhead
- Cut Back** to 12-inch height
- Leave in Fall**; clean up in Spring

 If Code A or B in Feb. or March - For the beneficial insects to emerge, no clean up until consistent temps in the 50's; may need to delay clean-up into April.

- Shake** to remove dead needles & use strong hose to dislodge
- Head Back** to lower side branch or outward facing bud to reduce height

- Thinning Out Pruning** - select the oldest, woodiest stems in the shrub and completely remove to the ground. Remove no more than 1/4 to 1/3 of the total number of the branches in the shrub each year
- Do not cut into old wood (dead zone) that has no leaves or needles
- Cut Candles** (new growth) in half when needles are fully elongated - only when needed to control size
- Rejuvenate** plant by cutting to approx. 6 inches from soil level

### Pruning Guidelines - Perennials & Grasses

- Cut Back** to just above ground level in Designated Month
- Remove dead / dying foliage
- Cut Back** to just above ground level after Peak Bloom
- Deadhead
- Cut Back** to 12-inch height
- Leave in Fall**; clean up in Spring
